





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
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THE MASTER



Dear All,

Happy New Year! Since our last Guild Newsletter was published in July 2021, we have seen a return to some kind of normal and it has been wonderful to see so many of you at our events!

The four pillars of the Livery are charity, education, fellowship and industry and I think we have definitely upheld these over the past six months. We raised over £400 for The Lord Mayor's Appeal and the Master's charity, The Duke of Edinburgh's Award, through our Young Freemen Walk the City fundraiser, virtually circling the city 99.47 times in September. We also gave our time to support the Worshipful Company of Woolmen in their Sheep Drive on Southwark Bridge, escorting over 960 people as they exercised the ancient right of Freemen to drive sheep in the City. This fantastic event raises thousands of pounds for the Woolmen Charitable Trust and The Lord Mayor's Appeal and so many

people remarked on what a fantastic job the Young Freemen did on the day.

By taking part in several City events, we are educating ourselves on the history and traditions of the City of London – and nothing says that more than The Lord Mayor's Show in November, a day of pomp and pageantry dating back to 13th Century. Extinction Rebellion disruptions aside, it was a brilliant day bringing together Livery Companies, charities, City institutions and companies to celebrate the new Lord Mayor (and yes, we ended up getting decent coverage on BBC!) followed by a delicious meal at City Livery Club and a chance to chat.

One of the things I love about the Guild of Young Freemen is that it brings together people from so many different industries, professions and Livery Companies. I can be talking to a Merchant Taylor, an International Banker or a Basketmaker at one of our Informal Drinks and get an insight into their Company and, in some cases, get an introduction to find out more. Some of you will know that I joined the Young Freemen without a Livery Company in 2012 and it was through the Guild that I was introduced to and joined the Educators in 2016.

Our return to in-person events in July started with The Sword & The Crown Military Musical Spectacular on Horse Guards Parade and our Garden Party & Guild Bake Off and that conviviality of getting together again continued into the autumn.

For me, an absolute highlight of the past six months was our Annual Banquet in October – bringing together 130 Young Freemen and guests at Apothecaries Hall. A number of Livery Companies were present, not only in our members, but also with visiting Masters, Aldermen and Sheriff.

That we are ‘young’ freemen can sometimes imply inexperience and ignorance on the civic City but I do not believe this is the case. We very much follow the mode of Livery Companies and Guilds with the exception that we are volunteer run.

I would like to thank the Clerk, Wardens, Officers, Court and Committee members for all their support over the past six months and can only highlight this letter received after the Banquet stating “I was very impressed by the dedication and commitment of Members and their enthusiasm. The Livery is in safe hands.”

I’m so excited to see what 2022 holds for the Guild and I look forward to seeing you again soon.

SPOTLIGHT ON THE CITY



The Worshipful Company of Coopers

“Coopers? Don’t they make barrels?” The immortal line that every Coopers’ Liveryman is undoubtedly asked. The answer, of course, is “yes - amongst other things”.

The Coopers’ craft focuses on making vessels for containing liquids, as well as solids, constructed by thin slabs of wood bound together in a circular form with hoops. This could range from casks of various sizes, of which a barrel is one of them; to vats; buckets; tubs and troughs.

The Coopers’ Fraternity came into being in the thirteenth century, at a time when uniquely English institutions, Common Law, Parliament and the legal system of royal courts were established. The earliest record of the London Coopers dates back to 1298, where the Coopers appeared before the Lord Mayor’s Court on behalf of their trade to plead their case against a fine that was imposed of thirty-one shillings.

The granting of its Royal Charter by Henry VII in 1501 was a landmark moment for the Coopers of London. It created a company where formally there was a fraternity and trade guild. It granted legal status of a corporation, able to own property in perpetuity. Most importantly, it enabled the Coopers to own their own Hall.

In 1490, the Coopers of London were given land on the west side of Basinghall Street, abutting on part of the City’s great heritage, Guildhall. Three Halls would be built on this site. The first was destroyed by the Great Fire of London. The second was pulled down following negotiations with the City of London Corporation who purchased a considerable portion of the site. Finally,

the third was tragically destroyed by enemy action in the Second World War and was compulsory purchased by the Corporation – sold for £48,500.

To this day, with tongue-in-cheek, Coopers complain that the Hall was sold for ‘pennies’ and practically ‘stolen’ by the Corporation. This is something Coopers take great pleasure in raising with the Clerk and Deputy Clerk of the Chamberlain’s Court when being granted the Freedom of the City of London, as the Chamberlain’s Court itself stands on this very site which Coopers’ Halls had stood for four hundred years.

Today the Coopers Company’s home is at 13 Devonshire Square, our fourth hall, a beautiful mid-Georgian building that has seen its own share of enemy action, being damaged by IRA bombs in 1992 and 1993.

Like all Livery Companies, the Coopers has its quirks and unique history. By tradition, it is the first Livery Company to be hosted at Mansion House by the new Lord Mayor. It was a Cooper, Sir Robert Willimott, who was the first Liveryman of a minor Company to become Lord Mayor. Another Cooper, Sir David Salomons, was the first Jewish and non-Christian to be elected Lord Mayor. Finally, the Coopers has a body that represents the Livery – the Society. This came about when the Livery challenged

the Court in reaffirming the historic rights of the Livery to elect the Wardens. To this day the Society, on behalf of the Livery, exercise this right along with organising social events.

Looking to the future, the Worshipful Company of Coopers is carrying out its strategic review considering the changing times in which we live. The Company is holding its inaugural cask race in Guildhall Yard, the very site of Roman London’s amphitheatre, this summer where teams from across the civic City are invited to enter. Finally, this article has drawn on two key histories of the Company: The Coopers Company and Craft (1933) by George Elkington and ‘Love as Brethren’ A Quincentennial History of the Cooper’s Company (2000) Pamela Maryfield – the first woman to be made a Liveryman of the Company.
