# A FOREWORD FROM THE MASTER



### Dear All,

Writing this foreword, I am struck by how quickly the six months since our Summer newsletter have flown by. I have been inspired to see the Guild firing on all cylinders with new initiatives, partnerships, and opportunities being created by the Court and Committees, and taken up by you the membership with equal enthusiasm.

It has been a pleasure to welcome so many of you to events in the first half of the year. From barrel racing at the Coopers' Cask Race to processing alongside the Basketmakers in the eclectic carnival that is the Lord Mayor's Show; there has been something for everyone, and it has been wonderful to see such a strong turnout at each event.

The highlight of 2023 for me was, unsurprisingly, the fantastic Annual Banquet in October at Barber-Surgeons' Hall. It was an honour to host such a strong delegation

of City and Livery leaders, all of whom commented glowingly on the incomparable good company they found in the Young Freemen. I would like to once again thank the incredible team of volunteers who made the evening so successful.

In 2023 we were able to deliver on a long wished for milestone of the Court, forming our first ever military affiliation. Those who attended the Annual Banquet will have seen the carpet guard of London Area Sea Cadets, resplendent in their dress uniforms: the first

of many occasions working with the cadets.

I am delighted that we have raised further sums of money towards my Master's Charity, the Great Ormond Street Hospital Charity, through the return of our "Walk the City" challenge. There is more to come for my second nominated charity, No Going Back, which will be announced in due course.

The Guild has joined two important pan-Livery groups: the Livery Climate Action Group and Pollinating London Together. These partnerships will deepen our ability to contribute to the future of the City, and create opportunities for the membership to get involved. We have also been invited to contribute to a new pan-livery policy framework by the Corporation and the Livery Committee, covering Diversity, Equality, Inclusion, and Youth, which will become an invaluable repository of best-practice advice for Companies.







The last eight months have featured a busy programme of engagements for Katharine and me, representing the Guild and advocating for the inclusion of young people in the Livery. So far we have completed 105 such engagements, including numerous banquets, a Coronation Ball, and shooting longbows with the Fletchers' Company: it has been tremendously varied!

It is engagements like these that provide opportunities to speak directly to Masters, Aldermen, and other influential City figures about why they should work with the Guild and the immense value-add that young people bring; and to find enthusiastic partners for our Meet the Livery series, with many Companies now requesting such events.

Turning to the year ahead, there is much more to look forward to with great events in the diary, and some special guests with sheriffs past and present speaking in March and April. I hope to see many of you at these events, and at the additional opportunities offered via our social groups.

It only remains for me to wish you all a prosperous and joyful year ahead as we march forward into 2024, and I look forward to seeing you all again soon.

## MASTER'S NOMINATED CHARITY

# Can you lend a hand?

No Going Back was launched in 2020 as a collaboration between 13 Livery Companies, with a mission to reduce the reoffending rate in the UK's prison population. This innovative charity aimed to harness the knowledge and connections of Livery members in order to achieve two things: 1) to provide **education** to prisoners and 2) to guarantee **gainful employment** for them upon release.

The cost of incarceration in the UK is over £46,000 per year per prisoner (slightly more than the fees for Eton College), and the overall prison sector estimated to cost £18bn each year. With a national average re-offending rate between 20% - 30%, and a prison population of nearly 82,000, this issue represents a huge strain both in economic and human terms. Having a job to go to upon release reduces the re-offending rate by 50%, yet too many are held back by a lack of skills: a 2019-2020 Ministry of Justice study found that the average adult prisoner has literacy levels below those of an 11-year-old. Without these basic skills, most

jobs are beyond the reach of ex-offenders.

Through the schemes which No Going Back, and their delivery partner BounceBack, run we have the chance to do something about this. Now going in to its fourth year and with the support of forty plus Companies, No Going Back has gone from strength to strength: they have delivered sessions in prisons around London to over 2000 prisoners, and of that over 250 have gone on into stable employment upon their release: we'll let you do the maths on how much economic impact that has!

The charity is looking for volunteers to help them with the delivery of sessions both in prisons and in the community, in person and virtually, on a range of topics. We take many of these skills for granted as the basic building blocks of adult life, but for those from the most disadvantaged backgrounds they are so often simply not taught. Workshop topics include:

 CV writing, interview practice, personal development: Leading participants through workshops designed to teach them how to present themselves professionally, what to expect in a job interview, and how to write an effective CV.

- Wellbeing & Nutrition: Delivering workshops in kitchen-based settings to teach cooking skills, meal planning, budgeting, and how to stay healthy.
- **Digital Skills:** Teaching participants IT skills that will enable them to search and apply for jobs online, as well as creating and managing their social media presence on various platforms.
- And so much more...

No Going Back provides ample support and coaching for volunteers too, ensuring that you are as well-equipped as possible to deliver sessions to this vulnerable cohort. A secondary part of their work is around changing the perceptions we all have of prisons, so it is also possible to volunteer on a 'prison visit' to see how the charity is delivering projects to change the lives of prisoners for good.

She is a departmental Equality, Diversity and Inclusion Group committee member and a keen promoter of women in property.


In her spare time, Laura enjoys backpacking particularly in the Balkans and Nepal and often hosts dinner parties replicating the recipes from her travels.

# The Worshipful Company of Gold and Silver Wyre Drawers

The Worshipful Company of Gold and Silver Wyre Drawers received their first Charter of Incorporation from King James I, confirmed by Royal Proclamation but subsequently withdrawn. It was thought the commercial use of precious metals depleted the stock for coinage in the country. However, the trade flourished, and in 1693, King William and Queen Mary granted the Gold and Silver Wyre Drawers their second Royal Charter. This makes the Company one of the few organisations holding a Charter from these monarchs.

Last year, the Treasures of Gold and Silver Wire exhibition held at the Guildhall Art Gallery from 29th September 2023 to 31st December 2023 celebrated the 400th anniversary of the First Charter of the Worshipful Company. Drawing close to 10,000 visitors from across the globe, the exhibition showcased an array of historical items and meticulously crafted contemporary creations. The exhibition garnered significant media attention and was featured in the New York Times and British Vogue.

Traditionally, gold and silver wire threads were used for Royal and aristocratic clothing, ecclesiastical robes and military braiding. Today, Freemen and Liverymen of the Company craft award-winning pieces and contribute to projects featured in major films, high fashion runways and Beyoncé's Renaissance World Tour.

Like numerous other ancient Companies, the Gold and Silver Wyre Drawers have witnessed the evolution and modernisation of their trade connections over time. The current membership is made up of avibrant and diverse community of Liverymen and Freemen who are practicing their trade as embroiderers, jewellers, silversmiths, as well as professionals working in the cutting-edge technology using microchips which contain pure gold wire.

The Gold and Silver Wyre Drawers play an active role at supporting and promoting its trades. For many years, the Company has provided sponsorship to the Royal School of Needlework and Goldsmiths' Craft and Design Council. One of the recent milestones includes establishing a partnership with the University of Cambridge Department of Computer Science and Technology. The Company now presents an annual award for the best graduate or post-graduate student, acknowledging excellence and achievement in designing computing hardware.

Charitable giving lies are the core of the Company's mission, with a call for all Liverymen to contribute regularly to the Livery's Charitable Fund. The Company focuses on medical, educational, music and children's charities, specifically those of smaller sizes or with specific projects. In 2023, the Master's nominated charity was the Chiltern Centre, dedicated to empowering young adults with disabilities across the South-East of England. The Company also supports various City's initiatives and the military.

Lastly, the Company has numerous affiliations to the Armed Forces, rooted in its historical connections with the art of military braiding. These affiliations encompass units from the Royal Navy, the Royal Logistic Corps, the Royal Air Force and the Cadets. Notably, the Company maintains a link to the Explosive Ordnance Disposal. During some of the Army Visits, small groups of Liverymen had the opportunity to safely experience the shock wave of high explosives.

As it marked its quatercentenary, the Worshipful Company of Gold and Silver Wyre wholeheartedly embraces traditions and modernity through its support for the trade and craftsmanship of its members.



Whether you're looking to experience exquisite music and worship, or simply seeking a quiet moment in the heart of the City, St Michael's Cornhill has much to offer.



St Michael's boasts one of the finest organs in the City: some of the pipes date back to the 17th century, when the opening recital was given by Henry Purcell. Recitals continue to this day, and St Michael's still enjoys a close relationship with the Royal College of Organists, which was founded at the church in 1864. St Michael's also supports a thriving choir who sing a weekly Choral Evensong service during term time.

The church is open from 9:00am-4:30pm during the week, and Guild members are always welcome to pop in.
