

SPOTLIGHT ON THE CITY



The Worshipful Company of Basketmakers

When I mention that I am a Liveryman of the Worshipful Company of Basketmakers, the question that I invariably get asked is "But I bet you've never actually made a Basket?" "Ermm yes, I have – several in fact"

Basketmaking is a very ancient craft and the oldest known baskets discovered so far were found at Fayum in Egypt and have been carbon dated to around 10,000BC. The Worshipful Company of Basketmakers cannot claim such a long history but was formally constituted in 1569 to help support the trade.

Basketmaking has been called the mother of pottery, as a potter used a basket mould long before the invention of the wheel. Pieces of Neolithic Age pottery show that the clay had been moulded around a basket structure. Stone Age pots often were ornamented with basketwork patterns.

Moving through history, we encounter houses built of wattle, shields fashioned of wickerwork, coracles or very large baskets covered with hide which the Romans saw on the Thames when they first came to this land.

Prior to 1569, English basketmakers obtained their freedom of the City and were permitted to practice their trade within its walls by joining the Butchers' Company, whose members used baskets extensively. In those days, Pudding Lane was largely inhabited by basketmakers, turners and butchers. Like the butchers, the turners not only used baskets but also sold them; and we hear of basketmakers becoming Freemen of the Turners' Company.

Unlike some Companies which have lost their trade connection altogether or have adopted a modern alternative, we maintain a strong link with our origins by our support for basketry through prizes and awards; holding exhibitions; arranging tuition for members and their friends as well as in London schools; promoting our Yeomen Members who are all working basketmakers and through our support for the Basketmakers' Association.

For centuries our members were all professional Basketmakers, and we regulated their trade in the City. Today we welcome people from all walks of life

Basketry is relevant to modern life and found in many forms, ranging from hanging baskets of flowers, via the increasingly popular basketwork eco-friendly coffins, to baskets used for hot-air ballooning. Contemporary or traditional designs of basketwork, chairseating and even sculpture have boosted interest in the craft, as has a desire to avoid the litter and pollution caused by throw-away plastic bags.

Willow Giants made by basketmakers are believed to have been part of the Lord Mayor's Show since the Reign of Henry V.

I first got to know the Basketmakers via the Guild's association due to the Lord Mayor's Show, followed by a basketmaking day organised for us, my first attempt ... well it ended up as a frisbee for my cats instead of a fruit platter! Things have improved a lot since then, I've made a basket and several Christmas decorations out of willow. I look

forward to many more enjoyable days to come. Our well-known basketmaking days are a joy to attend, albeit you have to learn patience you just can't rush a basket, albeit you could make one out of rush. I personally prefer weaving with willow as when I tried chair caning with rush it just ended up twisted!

Little did I know at the time that my grandfather was a Liveryman of the Basketmakers, but it's true they are one of the friendliest Livery Companies.

As I leave the Guild of Young Freemen (no longer Young but creaky bones instead) I look forward to seeing you all at the Lord Mayor's Show on 12 November where hopefully I'll be joining you as a Basketmaker.

My one piece of advice to all Young Freemen is to take part in as many events as possible and join the events, membership or charity committees as it will open your eyes to many different opportunities around the City.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all Young Freemen for their kind friendship and opening my eyes to the City and the Livery World, if it wasn't for you I probably would not have joined the Basketmakers.


